




Tips for Living: Grievances and Complaints

We at Landis Adult Day Services strive to provide the best quality service that we can and to provide each client with a good day while they are with us. If you and/or your responsible party is dissatisfied with your care plans, services, or treatment received at Adult Day Services, the following grievance/complaint procedures are available to you as a matter of right:

- 1. You may discuss the matter with the Director of Adult Day Services.
- If the first step is not satisfactory, you can request a discussion with the Vice-President of Operations/COO or designee. Additional team members may be asked to join discussions as needed.
- 3. If no solution can be found in these first two steps, you may proceed with your grievance and submit it to the Landis Communities President and/or the Lancaster County Office of Aging.
- 4. If you are still dissatisfied, you may contact the Pennsylvania Department of Aging, which is the licensing body of Adult Day Services, at 717-783-6207.
- 5. The local Long-Term Care Ombudsman may also be contacted at 717-299-7979 or 1-800-801-3070 (toll free).
